## **Gardens in Polstead Road, Chalfont Road, Rawlinson Road, Hayfield Road and Woodstock Road.**

Bryan and Cynthia Wardley's Garden at 19 Polstead Road combines Japanese ideas with the use of Alpines and small plants.

Martin Haward, a Chelsea medal winner, has designed Jane Martineau's garden at 24 Polstead Road. It has a very interesting formal layout. By popular request to see the development four years on.

Rebecca and Tim Jenkinson have a family friendly garden at 27 Polstead Road.

Liz Wade's garden at 28 Polstead Road where a **Bouncy castle will help keep the children happy.**

Julia Aston Smith's garden at 32 Chalfont Road offers old and new roses and other fragrant plants in a simple and peaceful setting

Rani Lall's garden at 9 Rawlinson Road has been designed by 'Eanteh' in the Lutyen's influenced New Delhi tradition. It combines the hard landscaping with the brilliance of well chosen plants.

Heather Veevers at 73 Hayfield Road gives an example of a long narrow garden, divided so that it effectively "widens" without blocking the view to the canal. Only re-structured 4 years ago, it is still very much in progress. Includes several small sculptures by the owner.

Mary and Norman Gregory's garden at 179 Woodstock Road is relatively wide among the surprisingly varied Victorian plots on this stretch of the road. Below a raised patio the central lawn area features curved side borders with large trees at the bottom. The borders have mature shrubs, perennials and a newly planted rose area, and are fronted by annuals.
